Iconic View Protected

The view from the hill overlooking Chocorua Lake is iconic, from the historic barn downward to Little Chocorua Lake, past the Narrows Bridge, over Chocorua Lake and up to majestic Mount Chocorua. Each year thousands of photos are snapped of this beautiful view.

For 140 years, the Bowditch family has preserved this view. In 2013, the state chose this iconic view to represent New Hampshire on the "America the Beautiful" quarter.

This historic view is now protected forever thanks to a recent agreement between the Chocorua Lake Conservancy and the Bowditch family for the Conservancy to purchase a perpetual conservation easement on the property. This agreement continues and memorializes the Bowditch family's long history of conservation and stewardship.



Lynne Flaccus Hired as Stewardship Director



Almost 50 years after the founding of our predecessor organizations, the Chocorua Lake Conservancy has hired its first full-time employee!

We are excited to welcome Lynne Flaccus to the position of Stewardship Director. Lynne will be responsible for advancing the stewardship program of the Conservancy, which is responsible for managing or stewarding 3,800 acres of protected land in the Chocorua Lake Basin.

As Stewardship Director, Lynne will establish personal contact with each owner of protected land and will work with the landowner to create a "current conditions" report for each covenant or easement, to establish a baseline against which changes in the land can be assessed for compliance with the governing document.

Building on these initial contacts, Lynne will recruit and train volunteers to assist with annual landowner contacts and property visits, to offer assistance with land management questions, and to update Conservancy records to reflect any changes in protected properties.

Many of Conservancy's conservation covenants date from the early days of land conservation in the United States. The creation of conservation covenants represented a pioneering and herculean effort on the part of founders of the Conservancy's predecessor organizations. The Conservancy's records contain important information about each covenant, but modern standards of land trust practice require that we establish up-to-date systems for maintaining relationships with the owners of protected lands and for assuring that our information about each parcel remains current with the passage of time.

Lynne has a lifelong connection with the Chocorua area. She spent her childhood summers and many vacations at her grandmother's' house in Tamworth, of which she is now a co-owner. She spent much of her youth and early adult years exploring, hiking, fishing, and canoeing throughout Chocorua, Tamworth and the Sandwich Range. After college, she spent four years living and working in the area.

"There has always been a special spot in my heart for Tamworth and the Chocorua Lake area!" Lynne says.

Lynne brings to the Chocorua Lake
Conservancy almost 30 years of experience
in land conservation and stewardship,
managing protected properties, studying
wildlife, and educating adults and children.
Most recently, she served as Education
and Stewardship Specialist at Midcoast
Conservancy (Wiscasset, Maine), where
she was the point person for all stewardship
activities. Lynne spent the prior five years
as Programs Manager at the Sheepscot
Valley Conservation Association (Newcastle,
Maine), where she implemented a wide range
of stewardship and conservation programs,
and natural history education.

This Stewardship Director position is partially funded through generous grants from the Tamworth Foundation, the New England Grass Roots Foundation, the Davis Conservation Foundation; and the Norcross Wildlife Foundation.

Lynne will be supervised by Peg Wheeler and Alex Moot, with support from Paul Doscher, who recently retired after 27 years at the Society for the Protection of New Hampshire Forests.

What is Land Stewardship?

When a land trust accepts a conservation covenant or easement, it accepts a perpetual, legal responsibility to protect the conservation values described in that covenant or easement, to visit and inspect the protected property on a regular basis, and to uphold the terms of the covenant or easement. The Conservancy must provide the resources to support the following five major responsibilities of land stewardship:


- 1. Creating baseline documentation, which is a detailed report prepared prior to closing that describes the conservation values and condition of the property, and requirements for monitoring the property on an ongoing basis.
- 2. Visiting and monitoring each site on a regular basis to confirm and document, in writing, that the conserved property is being maintained according to the terms of its covenant or easement.
- 3. Communicating regularly with landowners who have signed conservation covenants or given conservation easements, including the tracking of ownership changes if the property is sold or passed from one generation to the next.
- 4. Investigating all apparent violations of the covenant or easement terms.
- 5. Addressing any departure from the conservation terms when and if needed, to be sure that those terms continue to be honored.

Lake community and a devoted conservationist. In 2006, Jim Bowditch conceived and carried through to its completion the awarding of the coveted "National Historic District" status to the Chocorua Lake Basin and its viewshed.

The agreement with the Bowditch family prohibits any additional structures or residential use while preserving the present view. A portion of the property will be designated for public access to enjoy the historic view.

The project is supported in part by a grant from New Hampshire's Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP), demonstrating the state's recognition of preserving such a special place.

Later this year, the Conservancy will be asking lovers of Chocorua Lake and the Basin to contribute to that portion of the acquisition cost not covered by the LCHIP grant, and to a fund to provide for the management and administration of the property and of the easement.

The Board needs members to serve on various Conservancy committees:

- *Land Conservation:* Responsible for the stewardship and protection of existing conservation covenants and easements owned by the Conservancy, and for the identification and acquisition of new easements and other land interests which help the Conservancy achieve its mission.
- *Lake Protection:* Responsible for the monitoring of water quality in both Chocorua Lake and its tributaries and preventing aquatic invasive species through careful monitoring.
- *Property Management:* Responsible for management of Conservancy-owned property, including the Chocorua Patrol and the maintenance of all public access areas, the Narrows Bridge railings, and the Little Lake dam. Responsible for managing Conservancy lands in accordance with the current Forest Management Plan.
- *Education & Outreach:* Responsible for communicating the Conservancy's mission, goals and programs to various constituencies. Organizes occasional educational workshops and community-building events.
- Governance & Nominating: Responsible for the general affairs of the Board of Directors, by ensuring that the board processes, structure and roles are effective. Responsible for identifying and nominating new members to the Board, and for helping Committees identify additional members. Responsible for records management.
- *Finance:* Responsible for overseeing the fiscal affairs of the Conservancy and the work of the Treasurer by ensuring the proper systems, procedures, and controls exist.
- **Development & Membership:** Responsible for overseeing fundraising efforts which promote membership growth and create a diverse philanthropic revenue stream that ensures the Conservancy's financial ability to carry out its mission.


Celebrating Tamworth's 250th

2015 Annual Report Chocorua Lake Conservancy

President's Letter

On behalf of the Board of Directors, I would like to thank all of our members, friends and other donors for their generous support during 2015.

After 48 years as an all-volunteer organization, I am excited to announce the Conservancy has hired Lynne Flaccus as our first full-time staff person (see cover article). Lynne will be starting in May 2016 as Stewardship Director. Please welcome Lynne to the Chocorua Lake Basin community when you see her.

I am also excited to announce the signing of an agreement with the Bowditch family to protect in perpetuity the iconic view from the hill overlooking the Little Chocorua Lake, Narrows Bridge and Chocorua Lake (cover article). Special thanks to Bill Vander Clute, Bruce Bowditch, John Watkins and Peg Wheeler for their hard work on this agreement to protect this important view and provide public access.

Financial Results: During 2015, the Conservancy spent a total of \$82,540, which is 4.7% more than we spent in 2014. In 2015, the Conservancy received \$65,462 in contributions from members and other donors, plus \$20,000 in grant funding for the Stewardship Director position. The Conservancy ended 2015 with a \$10,146 surplus. However, if one subtracts the grant funding reserved for the Stewardship Director position, which will be spent in 2016 and 2017, the Conservancy ended 2015 with a -\$9,854 operating deficit.

Members: During 2015, the Conservancy received financial contributions from 307 households, a 31% increase over 2014.

Our 83% membership renewal rate in 2015 was a bit lower than last year's 88% renewal rate, but still much higher than most land trusts. The Conservancy added 60 first-time donors and brought back 53 lapsed donors. The number of local, year-round member households and donors jumped to 75 households, a 70% increase.

We are grateful for the generosity, trust, and most importantly, commitment of our members to our mission. The Conservancy only succeeds in our mission to protect the scenic and natural resources of the Chocorua Lake Basin because of our members

Preparing for Perpetuity

A pristine lake, an undisturbed lakeshore, a forest in its wild state, a beautiful field - appreciating the beauty of nature is just the beginning for the Chocorua Lake Conservancy.

With each new (and old) conservation agreement comes a deep and permanent responsibility: we have promised to look after, or steward, the conservation protections placed on this land forever. Regular land stewardship satisfies the legal and ethical obligations created when the Conservancy, or one of its predecessor organizations, accepted a conservation covenant or easement.

Past leaders of the Conservancy and its predecessor organizations carried out these responsibilities through personal connections with landowners who, in most cases, were the original donors of the covenant or easement.

Generational changes, both among landowners and among the leadership and volunteers of the Conservancy, and evolving standards of land trust practice and recordkeeping, now require that Conservancy approach this responsibility in a more systematic manner.

Today, all land trusts are obligated to establish and carry out a regular program of checking to be sure that the covenants on each conserved property are being honored. Building relationships with landowners — walking their land with them and working to address common concerns — goes a long way toward making sure that our conservation agreements are upheld.

After much debate, the Conservancy board decided in 2015 that our all-volunteer land trust did not have enough volunteers to fulfill its stewardship obligations towards 74 conservation covenants and easements covering almost 3,000 acres. Thanks to the efforts of board members Peg Wheeler and Melissa Baldwin, the Conservancy was able to secure four grants totaling \$24,500 towards this position.

We are excited to welcome Lynne Flaccus to the position of Stewardship Director.

The hiring of Lynne as Stewardship Director position and adoption of modern stewardship practices will assure local residents and visitors that the Conservancy's conservation holdings are being cared for in a manner that protects the interests of all and maintains the unique qualities which our predecessors worked so hard to preserve.


